



TREASURER'S INTERIM REPORT Accounts



The averaged weekly collections for the year to date are:

Envelopes, Cash and Standing Orders $\begin{array}{c} \underline{2017\text{-}18} \\ \underline{£} 476 \\ \end{array} \begin{array}{c} \underline{2016\text{-}17} \\ \underline{£} 480 \\ \end{array}$

Other activities including plant sale, dancing, quiz, coffee shop, film club and rental income (the latter up 10%) are continuing to support our incomes. A further quiz is planned for later in the summer.

Expenses are broadly in line with previous years with the exception of utilities up 20% due to the long wet winter and repair costs are well down on last year as repair costs in the previous year were particularly high.

Although the position is again tight I see no reason at this stage in not achieving a break even position.

The Organ Fund stands at £12,866 when gift aid receivable is included. The organ recital raised in excess of £650 and we hope are to have a further choral event later in the year. The refurbishment of the organ is being phased over a period of time in order that we do not lose the use of the organ for any long period of time. Work in this direction has started with releathering of pedal primary motors and fitting new leather buttons and red cloth washers after stripping down swell to great coupler totalling £1,494.

The Redevelopment Fund stands at £8,515 with a further £10,000 receivable from District. Negotiations regarding the entrance improvements are ongoing and have incurred further professional fees.

Norman Sykes Honorary Treasurer

We are very happy to report here that the three events we hosted during the Bramhope Summer Festival – The Organ Recital, Film Club Evening and Afternoon Tea, raised a total of £257.91 for the Cystic Fibrosis Trust. With thanks to the Parish Council for once again organising a successful summer festival.

Memories of Bramhope Chapel and Hilton Grange

Our Minister, Rev Roger, recently received this email from a lady who had been looking at our website and felt she had to write to us. As you can imagine this prompted a lot of discussion and memory searching. We thank DP for sharing this with us and send many good wishes in return.

"Dear Revd. Smith,

I have been reminiscing while surfing your web page, and I was delighted to see photos of the interior of your beautiful chapel.

The chapel played an important weekly part in my life, during the years 1943 to 1947 when my two sisters and I were evacuated to the NCH&O (now Hilton Grange). Every Sunday, morning, when the weather permitted, we walked in a crocodile down to the Chapel, and I would gaze up at that soaring arch emblazoned with "Oh, worship the Lord in the beauty of Holiness". Those words don't seem to be there any more. I also remember the pink and grey marble panels of the pulpit and font, the gleaming brass filials(?) at the ends of the pews, and the entrancing stained glass windows.

My sisters and I lived in Butterfield II House, under the care of Sisters Kathleen and Ruth, and Novice Ellen. After we left the Home, Sister Kathleen wrote to us several times and Mr. Butterfield took me to see Gilbert Harding, Lady Isobel Barnett and Stew Macpherson engage in "Twenty Questions". The Friends of the Home were wonderful people. Every Christmas they provided old lisle stockings for us to hang in the hall on Christmas Eve, they sent parcels to open on Christmas Day to the orphans or evacuees who would otherwise have received nothing, and I remember one summer that a group of ladies gave us beautiful summer dresses, six pink (I had one of those), six yellow, six green and six blue, and straw bonnets to wear with the dresses. Wonderful, wonderful people.

I am 81 now. I was seven when I arrived at the Home, so I doubt whether any of the Friends who were so generous are alive now. But maybe they have descendants still living in the Bramhope area. If there are, I would like to say a sincere thank you to them, not only for clothes and presents, but for their constant care and support of small children who had been separated from their loved ones at a dreadful time in history.

Forgive me for rambling on. I have just finished writing a story about my childhood and your web page brought it all back to me.

Prayer, Worship, Study and Mission

You may have read this article which appeared in Issue 10 of the Connexion written by the Chair of Plymouth & Exeter District, the Revd Graham Thompson. If not, here it is, as it is well worth reading and thought provoking.

"Why do you go to church?"

This question is usually asked spontaneously and we find ourselves on the spot. So what answer should we give?

We go to church to worship God!

We enjoy being with God.

We want to celebrate all that Jesus offers, for we are people of the Resurrection – those who die and rise with Jesus and live every moment of every day certain that our risen Lord is in us and with us.

We offer praise to God for who God is and all that God means to us. We offer thanks for the many wonderful ways in which God has blessed us; for the privilege of enjoying a relationship with the eternal God.

Worship is the central activity of the Church. Without worship there would be no Church. You can take away Bible studies and prayer meetings, you can lose a Sunday school or youth group, you can ignore social evenings and home groups, but if you have worship, you are still a church, a poor church but still a church.

Self-fulfilling worship? In his report to the 2011 Conference, Rev Dr Martyn Atkins, said that having travelled around the country he had picked up a prevailing view that Methodist worship "neither reaches the heights nor plumbs the depths". Is he right? If he is, what has caused this and how might we change things?

I believe we get the worship we deserve. If we go to worship with a wrong frame of mind: without preparing ourselves (including praying for those who will lead worship); if we go with our minds made up as to what it is going to be like and what we will get out of it, questioning the length of sermon or choice of hymns, we then generate a self-fulfilling prophecy. You might find it helpful to think about other stumbling blocks to good experiences of worship, including these typically Methodist tripping hazards:

1) <u>The Preaching Plan</u> – along with the weekly Notices which lists who is taking next week's act of worship. <u>We need to move the focus away from the leader of worship to the God whom we worship</u>.

2) <u>Busy office holders</u> going to church with lots to sort out and people they need to talk to – focusing on the busyness of responsibility rather than the One for whom we seek to be useful. The privilege of worshipping the God of love; the God of all creation; the God who was, and is and is to come, means that our primary focus should be God.

Glorifying and enjoying God

Worship is when we come together to meet with God and any encounter with the living God will change us.

People leaving worship should be different – changed – by the experience of meeting God. Perhaps imperceptibly at first, but over time we are changed.

The Westminster Catechism states that the chief purpose of humanity is to glorify God and enjoy God forever Not to go to worship so that we can get something good from God. The principal focus of any worship is God.

Graham Kendrick, quoting Lamar Boschman, puts it like this: "Worship is first and foremost for God's benefit, not ours, though it is marvellous to discover that in giving God pleasure, we ourselves enter into what can become our richest and most wholesome experience in life."

Worship is the central activity of the Church and – perhaps – we could do better?

The Word of God - "Blessed are those who are generous, because they feed the poor"

I am sure that when you first read this you will think of the Sermon on the Mount. But this verse comes from a much earlier time as it is Proverbs 22v9. (New Living Translation).

In last month's Messenger my focus was on family but we all belong to a wider community and Proverbs has much to say about how we respond to those around us. The Ten Commandments and other early Jewish law contains instructions on how to live well in the community and many of the writings in Proverbs continue this theme.

Two further examples I have chosen are Prov.21v3 "Those who shut their ears to the cries of the poor will be ignored in their time of need" and Prov.28v27 "Whoever gives to the poor will lack nothing, but those who close their eyes to poverty will be cursed."

Although written around 960BC the Book of Proverbs continues to be relevant in the 21st century and many of its writings speak of how to show care and compassion in the community. But one verse quoted in the reference book I was reading made me smile, and showed that the writers were not so heavenly minded that they were out of touch with reality . So I leave you with this - Prov.25v17 "Don't visit your neighbours too often or you will wear out your welcome".






